April Awareness

April is packed with different awareness and celebration campaigns, including Month of the Military Child, Volunteer Appreciation and Autism Acceptance Month. You will likely see plenty of dandelion imagery on your base or child's school (the official flower of military children) and lots of blue or gold (colors associated with autism). Take a moment this month to learn a little more about how you can support these unique life experiences.

Reflecting the full month, Henderson Hall will be hosting Awareness Basketball on April 19th, with teams representing a variety of awareness campaigns including autism acceptance and military children, as well as child abuse and sexual assault.

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SCHOOL ILISON PROGRAM



One of the most common difficulties faced by military children is the transition from school to school with each duty station. On average, military-connected children will attend 6 to 9 schools from kindergarten through 12th grade. That's where installation school liaison programs come in! Experienced professionals are ready to answer your questions and support connections within and between schools. School Liaisons (SL) assist with class registration and credit transfers and refer for tutoring, after-school activities and homeschool resources. SLs work directly with schools to help them receive a Purple Star School designation. Purple Star Schools demonstrate ongoing commitment to students and families connected to the military through programming and policies. SLs are also subject matter experts on the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3), the compact that ensures consistent treatment of military-connected children particularly with enrollment, placement, attendance, eligibility and graduation.

NEW SL ON THE BLOCK



Did You Know?

Symbols of Autism Spectrum Disorder

There is no single, universal symbol used to represent autism. Perhaps the most commonly recognized symbol is the puzzle piece in primary colors, sometimes in a traditional "awareness" ribbon-style. Light blue puzzles are also common. Puzzles have been associated with autism awareness since the 1960s, however some agencies and individuals have moved away from the image to avoid the idea that individuals with autism don't "fit." For example, a research study from 2017 found participants associated puzzle pieces with "incompleteness, imperfection, and oddity" and recommended avoiding using the puzzle piece logo (Gernsbacher et al., 2017). The rainbow infinity symbol was adopted as early as 2005 and after followed a gold infinity symbol. The rainbow colors are intended to reflect neurodiversity while the gold color is used because the chemical symbol for the element gold, Au, is the first two letters in the word "autism." the infinity symbols are associated with the neurodiversity movement.

TICK? ICK!

THE NEED TO KNOW ON TICK-BORNE ILLNESSES



As green grass returns to the area, the population of pesky parasites like ticks, chigger mites and fleas hits its peak. You can reduce your risk of acquiring Lyme Disease, alpha-gal allergy, Rocky Mounted Spotted Fever and other tick-borne illnesses by taking preventative measures and inspecting for ticks after outdoor activities all year long.

- Wear long pants and shoes with socks-Light colors are best so you can see any ticks
- Tuck your pant legs into your socks and treat your clothes with 0.5% permethrin (avoid skin contact)
- Apply repellent to exposed skin (up to 50% DEET for adults and less than 30% DEET for children

MILTICK PROGRAM

Did you find a tick on yourself or your child after a romp outside? Get the tick tested to quickly determine exposure to tick-borne illnesses. The DoD Human Tick Test Kit Program is offered through the Army Public Health Center (APHC). You may submit the tick to a DoD health clinic or submit it yourself following the instructions from MilTICK. Eligible individuals include AD service members, National Guard, Reservisits, DoD Civilians, Contractors and Dependents of the previouslymentioned categories. Note: ticks attached to animals are not eligible for testing.



THRIVE: A UNIVERSAL PARENTING PROGRAM



The DoD partnered with the Clearinghouse for Military Family Readiness at Penn State to develop a free online program for parents. Using the age-specific, skill-building programs, parents can develop new skills and build on their parenting strengths. Trainings are tailored for birth through age 18. Additional supplemental modules tackle niche topics like adolescent mental health, co-parenting and raising a child with a disability. Access Thrive online.

OPERATION DEPLOY YOUR DRESS

A 501c3 nonprofit, Operation Deploy Your Dress has been providing gently used formal gowns and accessories to female service members and military spouses since 2015. Military ID cardholders can "shop" the boutiques at no cost to offset the high cost of attending formal military functions. There are eight boutiques on bases around the country and an annual pop-up boutique in the DC area. This year's pop-up will be held at the Military Women's Memorial in Arlington, VA on 13 April. 
Washington, D.C.

Chuck E Cheese


Sensory-Sensitive Sundays. Participating locations open two hours early on the first Sunday of the month.
