Attorney Tip: Half Day Removals

When a school calls a parent and says they need to pick their child up due to their behavior, the federal and state departments of education consider it a **suspension**. Schools often don't provide the paperwork for the suspension or consider it one, but it is a suspension. This is critical because students with disabilities cannot be suspended for **more than 10 consecutive days** during one school year, or 10 cumulative days if those removals constitute a pattern. If a child is suspended for more than 10 days, the school is required to hold a manifestation determination review (MDR). These partial day removals are important to count towards the 10 days, so you can get to an MDR faster. If a child is having behavioral issues, then there are steps the school should be taking, such as conducting a functional behavioral assessment and implementing a behavior intervention plan.

Parents: if you are removing your child from school, ask the school for suspension paperwork and keep track of how many days your child is missing due to these suspensions, and call an MDR at the appropriate time. If the school does not provide it, write a letter to the school saying that you were called to pick your child up on that date due to behavior and you are considering it a suspension.
