

SERVICE DOGS

Any dog trained to perform tasks for an individual with a disability.



EMOTIONAL SUPPORT DOGS

Medically prescribed animals providing therapeutic benefit through dedicated companionship.



THERAPY DOGS

Animal-assisted therapy involving animals as a form of treatment.

What's the difference between a service animal and an emotional support animal? The Department of Justice defines a service animal as a dog that is "individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability." Tasks must be directly related to the person's disability, such as detecting seizures or guiding a blind person. By contrast, an emotional support animal can be any species that "provides comfort just by being with the person."

Under the Americans with Disabilities Act, you can take a service animal to a public place like a movie theater or restaurant. The staff can ask only two questions: Is the animal required because of a disability, and what task has the animal been trained to do? You cannot be required to provide any documentation on the disability or the service animal. Service animals are exempt from no pet policies, pet surcharges, or specific breed bans. There are some exceptions; for example, a service dog can be prohibited from a portion of a college dorm reserved for students with allergies to pet dander.

To be allowed entry to a public place, a service or emotional support animal must be under control and housebroken. They must be leashed or tethered, unless doing so would prevent the animal from effectuating its duty. The dog may not bark repeatedly in a quiet place. An out-of-control animal can be excluded from the premises.

There will be a short training that should not take longer than 30 minutes.

During the first few meetings with your students there will be "getting to know you" activities that will be given to you from the new Barcroft ES POC. After a few weeks of getting to know your students and feeling comfortable with them you will be able to move on to mentoring.

Saturday December 3, 2022 is International Day of Persons with Disabilities Day $\left(\frac{1}{2} \right)$

The United Nations Decade of Disabled Persons was held from 1983 to 1992 to enable governments and organizations to implement measures to improve the life of disabled persons all over the world. On October 14, 1992, as this decade drew to a close, the UN General Assembly proclaimed December 3 as the International Day of Disabled Persons. This day was first observed on December 3, 1992. On December 18, 2007, the assembly changed the observance's name from the "International Day of Disabled Persons" to the "International Day of Persons with Disabilities". The new name was first used in 2008.
